What is Title I?

Title I is a federal program that provides funding to schools to help students who are struggling or at the most risk of falling behind.

- Title I funding is based on a school percentage of economically disadvantaged students

What does a School-Wide Program Look Like at OES?

How do students qualify for Title I?

A *School-Wide Program* allows the school to use Title I funds to support ALL students in ELA, mathematics, and science.

It is important to note that Title I funds are available for supplemental support and cannot supplant core instruction. This means Title I funds provide **additional** support for students.

The school will use assessment data to determine the needs of both individual students and needs of groups of students -- for example, in a school-wide program, if it is observed that kindergarten students as a whole have gaps in phonemic awareness, Title I funds can be used to provide supplemental instruction, materials, and training for educators to address this gap.

What Subject Areas and Grade Levels Does Title I Service?

Title I is primarily focused on reading, with the interventionist providing supplemental reading instruction. The Title I interventionist is considered highly qualified under federal regulations.

Raise Student Growth Proficiency (SGP) to 50+ as measured by State and local assessments.

Increase individual student performance levels to the next band as measured by State and local assessments.

Increase student proficiency by 10% on State and local assessments for each grade level and subgroup population.
